The KCICA Gold Medals in the Arts Ceremony took place in Cape Town This Saturday

Cape Town, April 14, 2018 - Karel and Stephanie Komárek, co-chairs of the Kennedy Center International Committee in the Arts recognized outstanding contributors to South African culture with the Kennedy Center Gold Medal in the Arts. The six artists who were presented the Medal are a diverse representation of outstanding artists in South Africa. The ceremony took place on Saturday, April 14 at the Zeitz Museum of Modern Art in Cape Town, South Africa.

"The culture of South Africa is known for its rich and unique blend of ethnic and cultural diversity. South Africa is also known for its stellar art scene. Stephanie and I are honored to represent the John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, the national cultural center of the United States and living memorial to President John F. Kennedy and recognize some of South African greatest artists." says Karel Komárek.

The Kennedy Center Gold Medal in the Arts is an award given annually to performers and arts leaders in the international community. This year they have been presented to: Basil J.R. Jones and Adrian P. Kohler of the Handspring Puppet Company, actor John Kani, the "First Lady of African Song" Sibongile Khumalo, exuberant storyteller Gcina Mhlophe and McCoy Mrubata, an accomplished saxophonist, collaborator, and bandleader.

The Kennedy Center International Committee on the Arts proudly bestows the Gold Medal in the Arts in recognition of extraordinary achievement in the arts each year at its international summit. The Committee awards inspiring individuals, whose lifetime achievements have created, nurtured, supported, and championed the world's greatest arts and artists.

2018 Gold Medal Recipients Biographies

Basil J.R. Jones and Adrian P. Kohler

Basil Jones and Adrian Kohler are internationally known for their astounding creations, which we have had the good fortune to see firsthand tonight. Partners in puppetry and in life for nearly four decades, these talented innovators went from performing out of a caravan, to producing their own plays on stages across Africa, to a groundbreaking collaboration of *War Horse* with the Royal National Theater of Great Britain.

Under Basil's and Adrian's guidance, Handspring has received a Special Tony Award, an Olivier Award, and many other awards.

John Kani

Few actors embody the history, resilience, and spirit of South Africa in the way that John Kani does. From leading the Market Theater's Serpent Players, to starring in several Tonywinning productions, to his recent role in *Black Panther*, John has earned his reputation as a household name in South Africa.

John's talent has taken him around the world, from London to Montreal to the Kennedy Center.

Sibongile Khumalo

Known as the "First Lady of African Song", Sibongile Khumalo is the crown jewel of a musical family. Inspired by parents who instilled in her a love of music and culture, Sibongile's talent

crosses borders as well as genres. She holds a deep dedication to keeping that tradition alive for future generations, advocating for arts education through her Deputy Chairmanship of the South African Music Rights Organization and the Khabi Mngoma Foundation, named in honor of her father.

Dr. Gcina Mhlophe

Gcina Mhlophe's exuberant storytelling has taken her across the globe, whether a library in inner-city Chicago, the Edinburgh Fringe Festival, or deep in the heart of Greenland. Named to the BBC's 100 Women Project, Gcina has put her creative mind to work throughout her career, collaborating with groups from Ladysmith Black Mambazo to local schools creating some truly unique works of storytelling genius.

Gcina's passionately strives to cement South Africa as a reading nation, providing books to rural areas, and hosting a book and storytelling festival in Durban.

McCoy Mrubata

McCoy Mrubata's childhood was filled with the sounds of the Langa Township, influencing his upbringing and setting the course for his entire life. An accomplished saxophonist, collaborator, and bandleader, McCoy's award-winning career has spanned the globe, from Johannesburg to Oslo. With talents ranging beyond live performance, his resume includes composing scores for South African drama productions and international stage productions of the lives of notable musicians.
